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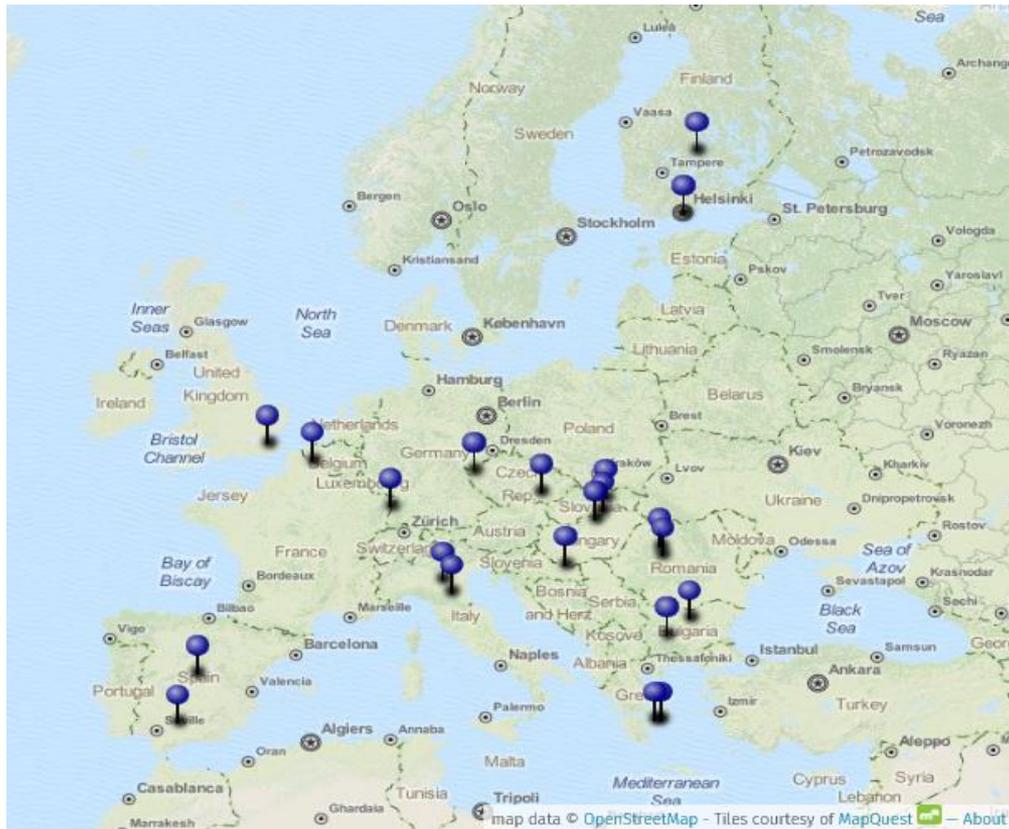
Why promote participation & empowerment?

- Ensure that money, resources and efforts actually improve the lives of rights holders
- Understand the realities and specificities of communities – to achieve real change
- Understand the complexities of social inclusion & exclusion
 - contextualise other data
 - first step towards addressing the real problems
- “Right to participation” & value of participatory approaches for empowerment, rights-based approach

What is LERI?

- Research question: Identify what *works* and what *doesn't work* for Roma inclusion at the local level – and *why*?
- Participation and engagement of local level stakeholders, *Roma and non-Roma*
 - Local authorities
 - Roma communities
 - Non-Roma neighbours
 - Local NGOs
 - Others (schools, service providers, housing authority, police, mediators, etc.)

2014 Preparatory Phase

Selection of localities, feasibility check, project plans, piloting, etc.

2015 – 2016 Implementation of Project Activities

Needs assessment, revision of plans, data collection, training, etc.

2017 - 2018 Final Outputs

Case studies, video clips & audio-visual material, comparative study, technical report on PAR, toolkit “Do’s & Don’t of Roma inclusion at the local level, etc.

- Participatory Action Research (PAR)
 - Participation
 - Action
 - Research
- Small-scale interventions
 - Facilitating real capacity building and participation
 - Producing knowledge on processes
 - Achieving tangible results for the communities
- Documentation of processes
 - The process itself is a key outcome of the project

- PAR light techniques
 - Peers as part of the advisory board
 - Peers as research staff
 - Interviews
 - Surveys
 - Public hearings
 - Focus groups
 - Visioning sessions/charrettes
 - Citizen's councils/citizen's juries/consensus conference

Participatory techniques

- PAR deep techniques
 - Peers as co-researchers
 - Forum theater / legislative theater
 - Participatory video
 - Photovoice

PAR in the context of Roma communities, an opportunity for:

- Giving local communities a real voice
- Implementing ‘nothing for Roma without Roma’
- Learning from the people
- Questioning common stereotypes in ‘Roma-targeted projects’

Empowerment of local people

- To gradually take over the research process
- To look critically at their own social reality,
- To think about their situation and take action

Challenges to participation

- Participation
 - Real participation of the community
 - Incentives to participate
 - Maintaining motivation to stay involved
 - Fluctuating willingness to participate
 - Depth of participation
 - Representation
- Trust
 - Mutual mistrust
 - Building trust
 - Power relations
 - Concrete outcomes needed
 - Time needed – to build trust, to implement activities, to ensure participation
- Community characteristics
 - Every local situation is different
 - Lack of past experience participating
 - Conflict of roles of experts/activists & their physical presence
 - Literacy and education levels
 - Political developments
 - Feasibility of expressed needs
- Other challenges
 - Contractual and management modalities
 - Ensuring quality of deliverables & process
 - External influences (e.g. elections)
 - Gender issues
 - Ethical concerns and sustainability
 - Transparency
 - Communication

LERI's KEY Messages

- **Building trust** is essential for the success of any social inclusion action
 - Keeping everyone informed & finding out what they most need
- **Participation** must be meaningful
 - Involving Roma as equals rather than as a token gesture
- **Empowering** people to claim their rights
 - Engaging in dialogue with authorities and developing shared understanding of needs and expectations
- **Acknowledging and learning from failure**
 - Understand why things went wrong to improve chances of success
